75 AIRCRAFT WORKSHOP, KLUANG

Due to considerable upheavals since our formation in October 1965, this is our first contribution to The Craftsman, but as we have now settled in, contributions will follow at regular intervals.

Our workshop is situated at Kluang, in the State of Johore, Malaysia, some eighty-five miles from Singapore, and includes a varied complement of Army, some Navy, and, shortly will include quite a number of RAF Technicians.
